
Lumina's Education and Community Support Programs

umina has long been known for our excellent medical care through hospice, palliative care, and more recently, Housecalls, our home-based primary care service. In addition, we value our role as a trusted source of information and support for anyone in the community facing, or simply curious about, end-of-life issues, serious illness, advance care planning, caregiving, grief and loss. Every month Lumina offers the public opportunities to attend drop-in support groups and community lectures that are open to anyone, no hospice affiliation required. We can offer these community support programs at no cost to participants thanks to our generous donors and funders. Lumina has received grant funding for current program offerings from Benton Community Foundation, Consumers Power Charitable Trust, Corvallis Community Thrift Shop, Siletz Tribal Charitable Contribution Fund, Trust Management Services LLC, and Oregon Cascades West Council of Governments Senior & Disability Services.

ur community educational calendar has been jam packed, and events have been well attended. The Lumina Death Café, a monthly discussion group, garners a lot of interest. Thus far during 2025, we presented the first event of Dr. Helen Kao's 4-part lecture series on dementia (pictured in photo). We launched a volunteer led End of Life Book Club, hosted two caregiver educational luncheons, offered a Medical Aid in Dying lecture by Dr. David Grube and an Advanced Directive planning workshop led by long-time Lumina volunteer Dr. David Cutsforth. Lumina also held a grief discussion with Sweet Home school counselors.

umina's monthly caregiver and grief drop-in support groups continue to provide a safe place for community members to come together for support. Several times a year we offer a Grief Education and Support Group workshop as well as a Powerful Tools for Caregivers class. We host two annual memorial services open to the community to remember those who have died (for more information on the 2025 May Memorial event, see the back of this newsletter). The modern-day house call provides medical care to frail or medically complex patients who are homebound due to physical or cognitive conditions. For these individuals, a visit to a medical clinic is either difficult or impossible.

We are so excited to celebrate Lumina's 45th anniversary during 2025! We have come a long way since our beginning. Founded as Benton Hospice Service in 1980, we were completely staffed by volunteers providing patient care and our financial support consisted solely of donations from grateful family members and the community. Our founders including Betty Johnson, David Connell, David and Jean Kliewer, and George Constantine would be proud of our organization and that we honor our foundational beliefs even to this day. Our values have stood the test of time. We provide clinically excellent care based on patient choice, compassion, dignity and respect, with the goal of improving the quality of life for patients with serious illness.

Today, Lumina has 38 employees and 92 volunteers. Our staff consists of Physicians, Registered Nurses, Medical Social Workers, Hospice Aides, Chaplain and support staff. Volunteers help with community events, support groups, and offer direct assistance to patients and their families. They can run errands, give respite, offer socialization as well as provide bedside vigils, so that no patient has to die alone. We are extremely grateful to have so many volunteers support our mission by offering their time and talents.

We have continued to thrive and provide the same compassionate care that we are known for through the pandemic and now on the other side. We are so thankful to be your locally grown independent non-profit hospice provider. We are honored to have been able to provide end of life care for 45 years and look forward to the next 45 years and beyond.

Bringing Hope Home with Housecalls

While providing geriatrics and palliative consults across the Willamette Valley over the past 9 years, I saw the tremendous need for home-based primary care in our community. In October 2023, with the support of the Lumina Board of Directors, philanthropic support from Benton Community Foundation and private donors, I made the leap to launch Housecalls. Housecalls provides geriatrics primary care and urgent care to enrolled patients. With advances in modern technology, tests such as ECG, x-ray, and ultrasound can be provided in the home. Nationally, housecall programs have been proven to dramatically improve health outcomes and quality of life for homebound patients and their caregivers. To date, Housecalls has served 87 patients and their families. The need for Housecalls services is so high that we are now maintaining a waitlist for new patients. Lumina is thrilled to offer this valuable service to our community and we hope to continue to grow the program to meet the need in our community. •
